On top of that, four out of ten U.S. adults are now in interfaith marriages. What Can You Do When You [or Your Faith] are Locked Out?

1. **Understand that being laughed at, left out, and locked out goes with the territory.** [Matthew 10:38; Luke 9:33; Matthew 10:34-36; Matthew 5:12]

2. **Don't go along to get along.** [Matthew 10:37-39; Matthew 12:32; Matthew 27:54]

3. **Do a fact check on the ways you've been sharing your faith.** [Matthew 5:10; Psalm 139:24]

4. **Deal with childhood wounds left in your adult kids.** [James 1:19]

Studies show that many grandparents are barred from grandkids because their adult children still harbor childhood resentments. [Conflicts That Can Lead to Grandparent Estrangement](#). Sometimes, they are just unwilling to entrust their children to the care of those who hurt them when they were kids.

5. **Remember, their salvation isn't dependent on you.** [1 Corinthians 3:6-9]

6. **Finally, pray, pray, pray, and then pray some more.** [Ephesians 6:18; James 4:2]
